The West End Schools' Trust (WEST) is a charitable company of eight primary schools and partner organisations located in the inner west of the city of Newcastle upon Tyne. The schools included in the Trust are: Bridgewater; Broadwood Primary School; Canning Street Primary; Hawthorn Primary School; Moorside; St John's Primary School; St Paul's Primary School and Wingrove Primary School.

Our Trust was formed in January 2015. We are responsible for the education of nearly three thousand pupils and employ almost three hundred teachers, teaching assistants and administrative staff.

When pupils leave our schools they are well prepared for the next phase of their educational journey. All of the schools are unique and although they may vary in size and context, Ofsted inspections for the cluster reveal effective schools that work in collaboration for the benefit of the whole of the community.




STEMtastic!

We held our annual STEMtastic! Conference at the Centre for Life for our year 6 pupils. STEM stands for Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics. The conference aimed to encourage pupils to explore STEM related concepts.

Steph McGovern from BBC Breakfast hosted the day for our 365 pupils. Her passion for STEM and enthusiasm to support young people helped the pupils really engage with the day. The pupils were eager to ask questions and get involved by standing on stage interviewing speakers and showcasing activities they had taken part in during the day.

Centre for Life and Northern Powergrid kindly sponsored the day and Enviresearch provided transport costs.



Health and Wellbeing Day — Moving On

Following on from the success of our Health and Wellbeing Day last year our Family Support Workers planned another day which was even bigger and better!

We encouraged pupils to learn about themselves as growing and changing individuals and supported them with 'moving on' from Primary School.

Newcastle United Foundation together with a range of other local organisations kindly supported the event which we held at St James' Park.



The children took part in a range of workshops including exploring oral hygiene, personal hygiene, general health including the need for healthy eating and exercise, healthy friendships based on mutual respect, mental wellbeing, travelling safely independently and staying safe online.

We are part of the West End Children's Community bringing together services, organisations and people to support our children and their families . We are grateful for members of that community for providing their support at this event.

School Council

Pupil representatives from all our schools regularly meet to discuss Trust wide initiatives. This year the main focus was the environment and taking care of where we live. All the Trust Schools were asked to design a logo to represent the school council across the whole Trust. Basiya Ghani from Wingrove Primary designed the logo which was selected as the winner.

Science Club

Children from each year group have been part of the WEST Tuesday science club at the Centre for Life.

This provides an opportunity to make friends with the "Junior Staff" who include Richard the Python, Consuella the Tarantula and Hackworth, Rocky & Loco the naughty Gerbils.

They carry out activities appropriate to their age, so the youngest children discover what weather makes snowmen melt whereas the oldest students will explore the differences between chemical and physical reactions.

The children learn how to use scientific equipment safely which puts them at an advantage when they go to secondary school.



As the children progress through the programme they become more confident about learning from mistakes, recognising that if you do not make mistakes you do not learn.

"The most amazing thing I witnessed this year was a group of year five students working out how the particles behaved in solids liquids and gases from scratch in less than 45 minutes. It would have been impressive for a GCSE class to achieve that but at the age of ten!

We understand that both mental and physical wellbeing are important. Using puppetry some of our Trust children explored their emotions and worked with a specialist nurturing practitioner.


Ctrl Pad workshops
